

**SIMI VALLEY TASK FORCE ON HEROIN PREVENTION  
MEETING NOTES - TUESDAY, JULY 31, 2012**

- Task Force Chairman Mike Judge called the meeting to order at 6:02 p.m. and led the Pledge of Allegiance. All Task Force members were in attendance with the exception of Task Force member DiFatta who had a death in the family.
  
- Public Comments:
  - Dan White submitted a report regarding heroin addiction to the Task Force advising a proactive approach to issues associated with heroin addiction.
  
  - Josie Hirsch expressed support for the report submitted by Mr. White and encouraged the creation of curriculum to educate children about heroin.
  
  - An announcement was made that Community Coalition United (CCU) is offering free training through Ventura County Behavioral Health on August 28<sup>th</sup> and 29<sup>th</sup>. The training will assist in identifying mental health and substance abuse disorders.
  
  - The Task Force was thanked for its work raising awareness and donating time. Mental Health training is being brought to the City and for those affected by the challenges of mental and emotional health.
  
- The June 28, 2012 meeting notes were reviewed and received by the Task Force.
  
- City Manager Laura Behjan presented the strategies ranked by the Task Force and additional strategies for consideration. The next step is for each identified agency to review the strategies and their impacts.

A discussion followed regarding the report presented by Ms. Behjan and the report submitted by Mr. White. A motion was made to adopt the report submitted by Mr. White, however the Task Force did not reach consensus to do so.

Following discussion, there was consensus to modify the Task Force on Heroin Summary Report to reflect that educational efforts should start at the sixth grade level and to refer the report to the City Council, Simi Valley Board of Education, and the Rancho Simi Recreation and Park District Board of Directors for review and feedback before adoption of a final report and recommended strategies.

- Task Force Reports
  - No task force reports are presented.

- Audience Comments

- Amanda Starn, a Not One More (NOM) member requested that schools reach out to parents and that people with addiction experience be invited to speak to parents and students.
- Rosie Alvarez stated that some youth are introduced to drugs as a result of taking prescription medication for ADHD and encouraged caution when diagnosing kids.
- Teresa Heier, a NOM Member, provided written comments encouraging drug education and prevention in the schools. She stated that people are using and selling drugs in local parks. School surveys regarding youth drug use will not be accurate. She encouraged that the report submitted by Mr. White be adopted.
- Expelling kids puts them on the street with more time on their hands and there aren't good referral systems in the County. Ambulances, school nurses, and Park Rangers should be equipped to deal with overdoses.
- Kevin Dieckilman, a Pastor in Simi Valley stated that the faith community is also working on this issue and offered to assist the Task Force in its efforts.
- Scott Miller asked if there are young people that are clean and sober that can speak to others and educators. Small businesses are not represented on the board and this may be something to consider in the future. Is there an amnesty program for kids? What happens when a kid says they are using drugs? The report should be adopted before forty-five days. If a businessperson is confided in about drug use, what should they do?
- Josie Hirsch stated that the discussions have been productive but there is still a task at hand, including mental health and behavioral issues, filling children's voids with something meaningful, and rewarding them for working hard. She suggested considering an Under One Roof concept.
- Robert Ortiz owns "Kid Gloves Boxing" in Simi Valley. The programs build self-esteem and allow children to voice their opinions and thoughts. He stated obstacles he experienced with putting on a show, "Knocking Out Heroin", at the schools.
- June Ewart thanked Rancho Simi Recreation and Park District for signing up to attend Mental Health USA, and to others who have shown interest, and encouraged the School District to participate.
- Dan White addressed the report he presented. Based on the School Board's input, the report's focus was placed on the 19 to 25 age group and Moorpark College. He stated that the Healthy Kids survey does not fully cover the drug use issues. He suggests the draft report be posted online for consideration. He will put the report on his website so it is available for review and comment, and will publicize it.

- Hope Vincent stated that parents want faster action. The education that Community Coalition United is important and offered at no cost. The education for the teachers through the program is helpful. The Simi Valley Heroin Task Force is being watched nationwide.
- Richard Shor owns Regenerate Films and wants to work with youth to produce public service announcements.
- It was suggested that the Chairs and CEOs of each agency meet to discuss the strategies and a means of evaluating their effectiveness.
- The next meeting will be held on Wednesday, September 12 at 6:00 p.m. in City Hall Chambers.
- The meeting adjourned at 7:56 p.m.

### RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended the Task Force review the feedback provided by the City Council, the Simi Valley Board of Education, and the Rancho Simi Recreation Park District Board of Directors regarding the recommendations contained in the Summary Report for use in finalizing the strategies to combat heroin abuse in Simi Valley.

### OVERVIEW

The City Council, Simi Valley Board of Education, and the Rancho Simi Recreation and Park District Board of Directors have reviewed the strategy recommendations made by the Task Force on Heroin Prevention related to their jurisdictions and have each indicated support for their implementation. The strategies that identify the City of Simi Valley as the lead agency, and the City Council's response is included in Attachment A (page 3). The Simi Valley Board of Education has indicated their support for the strategies that identify the Simi Valley Unified School District as the lead agency, and has provided an overview of the Drug Prevention Curriculum Implemented in the School District and the meeting agenda from their meeting with Not One More in Attachment B (page 5). None of the recommended strategies identify the Rancho Simi Recreation and Park District as the lead agency, however Rancho Simi Recreation and Park District has provided a response to the strategies and has taken additional action as provided in Attachment C (page 9).


There are a number of strategies that identify the City of Simi Valley, Simi Valley Unified School District and the Rancho Simi Recreation and Park District (Tri-Agencies) all as the responsible agencies, and those strategies, and the Tri-Agencies' response, is included in Attachment D (page 16).

The City Council discussed the recommendations relevant to the City at its August 20, 2012 meeting. As a result of this discussion, it was determined that due to current budgetary constraints, recommendations with a significant cost impact to the City cannot be implemented in their current state at this time, such as the addition of School Resource Officers. In an effort to be responsive to the request for additional Police presence on the school campuses, the Police Department is in the process of evaluating current resources available and opportunities to restructure to enhance the presence of the Police Department on the school campuses.

The City Council expressed its support for the strategies with minimal cost impacts related to education outlined in the Summary Report. In addition to the strategies included in the attachments, the City Council provided additional feedback related to the future of the Task Force and its mission. Included were recommendations that the Task Force expand its role from a focus on heroin to a focus on drug prevention, the use of Police Department volunteers in the community and on campuses where appropriate, a focus on identifying doctors who are over prescribing opiate based medications, expanding the membership of the Task Force to follow the structure of the Task Force on Homelessness, including engaging the medical community to participate, and setting Task Force meetings for a minimum of every other month.

## **SUMMARY**

The City Council, Simi Valley Board of Education, and the Rancho Simi Recreation and Park District Board of Directors have reviewed the strategy recommendations made by the Task Force on Heroin Prevention related to their jurisdictions and have each indicated support for their implementation.

  - Effective at improving students' social and emotional knowledge and skills, prosocial attitudes, and behavior.
  - Reduces problem and aggressive behaviors by building the social and emotional competence that is crucial for academic success.
  
- **Keepin' It Real (KIR)**
  - A culturally grounded drug prevention curriculum for grades 6-9 that has been proven effective for reducing drug use and establishing anti-drug attitudes and beliefs.
  - Teaches kids **HOW** to say "NO"
    - Alcohol
    - Tobacco
    - Other Drugs
  - Enhances life skills
    - Decision-making
    - Communication
    - Drug-resistant Strategies
  - The evaluation results have shown that the "program produced significant effect in reducing gateway drug use (alcohol, tobacco and marijuana), increasing attitudes that support drug-free choices, and increasing resistance strategies useful in avoiding drug use."
  - Implement curriculum in our 6th grade classes
    - Approximately 30 of our elementary teachers have been trained

- **The Brain: Understanding Neurobiology Through the Study of Addiction**
  - Developed through a partnership of the National Institutes of Health (NIH) and the National Institute on Drug Abuse (NIDA).
  - Created as a tool for high school science teachers to make this subject-area easier to teach and learn.
  - SVUSD uses this curriculum as a supplement to alcohol, tobacco, and other drug abuse prevention tools.
  - Taught in 10th grade
  - Curriculum covers:
    - Where do drugs act?
    - How drugs alter neurotransmission.
    - How drug abuse begins.
    - When does abuse become addiction?
    - Long-term effects of drug abuse and addiction.
    - Addiction and treatment.
  
- **Tobacco Free Generations**
  - Comprehensive tobacco-use prevention and intervention program for pregnant and parenting teens.
  - Provides seven cross-curricular tobacco-specific lessons with strong language arts and visual arts links.
  - Lessons emphasize the responsibility young parents must embrace for their own health and the health of their children.
  - This curriculum is used at Apollo High School in the Minor Parent Program.
  
- **Additional Classroom Curriculum**
  - Health curriculum includes
    - Tobacco
    - Alcohol
    - Drug Use
  - Physical Education curriculum addresses
    - Healthy Living
    - Effects of Drug and Alcohol Use

**SUMMARY**

This item was first presented to the Board during its regular meeting on August 16, 2012. A complete copy of the previous staff report is attached at Exhibit A. The next meeting of the Heroin Task Force is scheduled for September 12, 2012, at 6:00 pm. At its last meeting the Heroin Task Force requested its member agencies to review each of the applicable developed strategies and determine whether or not a response to each was feasible and/or appropriate. The table in the attachment indicates the proposed Park District response to each of the strategies. In most areas the Park District can either participate or directly implement the applicable strategies, and full cooperation with the Task Force, its members, and other community groups is contemplated. To date, the Park District has taken the following steps to help in the fight against the use of Heroin (see attached copies of some of these items at Exhibit B):

Participated on the Heroin Task Force

Expanded the Park District's web site to include; information about the Heroin Task Force and its members, links to the Task Force meeting agendas and reports, and links to other important web sites containing valuable information on this and related subjects

Attended and also hosted several meetings of the Community Coalition United

Hosted and attended a 12-hour Mental Health First Aid USA course put on by the Community Coalition United and Ventura County Behavioral Health

Agreed to host a second session of the 12-hour Mental Health First Aid USA course put on by the Community Coalition United and Ventura County Behavioral Health, on September 4<sup>th</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup>

Attended the Community Forums on heroin and other drug abuse and related issues held in the communities of both Thousand Oaks and Santa Clarita

Advertised the Task Force on Heroin Prevention's efforts on the District's "The Volunteer Scoop" for June 1, 2012, distributed to over 700 Park District volunteers

Published articles on Heroin use in the District's Fall 2012 Reporter and also in the District's Fall 2012 Oak Park Newsletter, combined circulation of approximately 47,000 households

Placed ads in both District activity brochures on the Anti Heroin Rally on September 15, 2012, organized by Not One More.

Included an ad on the Park District's Teen Newsletter for Fall 2012 regarding the upcoming Anti-Drug Community Forum to be held at the Boys and Girls Club in Simi Valley on September 27, 2012

Taped two segments with Time Warner Cable (links below) which address the Heroin Task Force, along with other RSRPD programs and events. They are available for viewing every Saturday and Sunday from 11:30 pm on TWC's So Cal Channel 101 and the California Channel (check local listing) under Local Edition. 
